Collect for Advent 2

O Lord, raise up, we pray, your power and come among us, and with great might succour us; that whereas, through our sins and wickedness we are grievously hindered in running the race that is set before us, your bountiful grace and mercy may speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, to whom with you and the Holy Spirit, be honour and glory, now and for ever.

Old Testament Reading: Malachi 3.1-4

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears? For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the Lord in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the Lord as in the days of old and as in former years.

New Testament Reading: Philippians 1.3-11

I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me, both in my imprisonment and in the defence and confirmation of the gospel. For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the compassion of Christ Jesus. And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight to help you to determine what is best, so that on the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through lesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

Gospel Reading: Luke 3.1-6

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.

Every valley shall be filled,

and every mountain and hill shall be made low,

and the crooked shall be made straight,

and the rough ways made smooth;

and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."'

Alternative Collect

Almighty God, purify our hearts and minds, that when your Son Jesus Christ comes again as judge and saviour we may be ready to receive him, who is our Lord and our God.

Post-Communion Prayer

Father in heaven, who sent your Son to redeem the world and will send him again to be our judge: give us grace so to imitate him in the humility and purity of his first coming that, when he comes again, we may be ready to greet him with joyful love and firm faith; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Rector writes:-

Have you seen the recent pictures from the Cathedral of Notre-Dame de Paris? When a church building is reopened after major fire damage, there's always something of a thrill — I remember it well from more than one of Durham Diocese's medieval churches back in the last century. But when the building is such an embodiment of national identity (not to mention famous literature) the wave of emotion in France will have been immense. The first pictures came ten days ago; yesterday was the formal opening; and today, Mass is celebrated once more, for the first time. The amazing work not only of rebuilding in historic materials, but also of cleaning the toxic residue of the fire (think of all that lead!) and the grime of the last two centuries, has been utterly immense. There could be no more fitting day for the resumption of the Cathedral's primary purpose than today (the Feast of what our Book of Common Prayer calls 'The Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary'). From the parish of two Churches of St Mary the Virgin, we send our good wishes to Paris.

Bell Louvres of St Neots (not Paris, yet...)

If you have been looking up at the SNPC tower recently, you will have noticed that, one side at a time, all 32 of the boxes of bell louvres have been replaced with new materials. This work has been made possible by a very generous donation (for which we are immensely grateful), and has been carried out with great skill by Stricklands of Crowland, who are experts in working with major old buildings. Stricklands do other work on both our churches from time to time, and we are delighted with what they have been able to do here.
